AUGUST

Today's program features **VIP/Cranston Village Fabric Group** representatives Richard Malachowski, from the Webster, MA print plant, and Ruby Batra from the New York Studio. They will be giving a slide presentation on how fabric is made. They will include color information and other aspects of fabric, quilting and sewing. Here is an opportunity to ask fabric related questions.

SEPTEMBER

Connie Broy, http://www.conniebeequilts.com, will give a workshop and trunk show at our September meeting on the 25th. The workshop will begin at 9 a.m. at Trinity Ecumenical Parish. Connie's trunk show features her award winning quilts. Connie has been featured in many quilting magazines and is known for her invention of the "spin ruler". There are many patterns and books featured on her website. Connie enjoys making the easy technique look difficult. You may wish to check out her spin ruler or her patterns.



These designs are made with Connie's spin ruler which she sells for \$16.95. The workshop does not use the spin ruler; rather it uses traditional nine patch cut into different designs, or as Connie calls it, "traditional patchwork in disguise".

In the morning Camouflage Patchwork workshop at 9:00 a.m. (cost \$15.00 for members), you will have the opportunity to piece a top using one of several designs, or you may cut and fuse several designs to show the many options available in the Camouflage Patchwork workshop. Connie will teach you how to piece a basic nine patch and then, through rotary cutting, create many different designs. This is an easy class and there are still openings if you are interested

Supply List A is for those who want to work with the design process on a smaller scale by doing a paste up and not take a sewing machine. Supply List B is for those who want to sew their design and have one quarter of it finished in class.

Supply List A (designing rather than sewing) includes 4 fat quarters (some light, medium and dark). Have one of (Continued on page 3)

the fat quarters as a focal fabric from which to pull other colors. Also bring a rotary cutter, cutting mat, paper scissors, fabric scissors, glue stick, pencil, C-thru ruler and 1 yard of paperback fusible web. There will be an iron available for all to use.

Supply List B (sewing in class and designing later at home) includes your sewing machine, 1-1 1/4 yards of a light, medium, dark and focal fabric (total 4-4 1/2 yards), rotary cutting supplies, paper and fabric scissors, surge strip/extension cord, sewing machine needles (80/12 or your preference), seam ripper and a medium shade thread (a light or medium gray).

OCTOBER

Melissa Hizy will show us how to do crazy patchwork on wool. This is a hands-on program with handouts. You will be furnished a kit at our meeting. Melissa and her helpers will show you how to do various embroidery stitches to make a small project. Later, but not in class, you will need 1 5/8 yards material for borders, 3 1/4 yards for backing and some batting for a 60" by 60" quilt. More information will be provided about this program in our next newsletter.

The Mountain Comforts Quilt Show is Saturday, October 27, 9:00 AM to 5:00PM in the Swartz Gym on the campus of Ferrum College. Jot that down on your calendar. If you and your spouse, kids or relatives want to "white glove" for 2 hours that day, get in touch with Ann Whalen (483-8924) or Kinza Pickelsimer (721-4824) to schedule your shift. In exchange for 2 hours to really look at the quilts, you will get free tickets to the Blue Ridge Folklife Festival, a parking pass and a back-road map so you can avoid the traffic jam. By the way, the quilt show is opening an hour earlier than the Festival this year. Beat the crowd!

THE DEADLINE FOR FILING YOUR ENTRY FORM FOR YOUR QUILT(S) IS OCTOBER 1. (The form needs to get to the Blue Ridge Institute before the quilt.) The entry form has information on drop off spots for quilts-but however you choose to turn in your quilt, it must be received for the judging by October 17. THERE IS A SPECIAL CATEGORY FOR FEEDSACK QUILTS THIS YEAR-it is in addition to any other entries you may have.

Sandra Ferguson is recruiting scribes and judging helpers to work with the 2 judges, Fran Kordek and Karen Keno. Judging is scheduled for 2 days, Thursday and Friday, October 18-19. This is a terrific learning opportunity. If you have never had the opportunity and would like to volunteer, give Sandra a call (721-7712). Because we include volunteers from other guilds which are show sponsors, it is also an opportunity to meet guilters from other areas.

There's still time to help your favorite young person make a quilt for the Young Quilters division. Mary Ann Spangler and the Bag Ladies have made 66 of those gorgeous tote bags that they displayed at our meeting. We will be selling any extras at the Show-the funds from the tote bags help defray the judges' fees and travel expenses.

Ribbon workshops and a workshop to sew additional back drapes will be coming up soon. Call me (483-1039) if you can help. Remember everyone who pitches in and helps make Mountain Comforts a success gets entered into the drawing for quilt books. At this time I'd like to thank Kim Deneault for her generous donation of Raggedy Reverse Applique patterns to the Young Quilters program and Sew What Fabrics and Batiks Etcetera in Wytheville and Quilt and Sew in Forest for donating fat quarters and cut fabric squares. Amaretto Sours Slush

1-46 oz. can pineapple juice

1-12 oz. can frozen pink lemonade

3 cups Amaretto 1/3 cup lemon juice

1-6 oz. can frozen lemonade

Mix ingredients and freeze at least 8 hours. (Just keep some in the freezer.) Scoop out enough to fill glass 2/3 full and fill with chilled club soda. Stir. Makes lots.

OUILT IN A YEAR

This year's project is titled "Celebrating the 400th Anniversary of Jamestown and our State of Virginia." We are leaving the fabric color and print choice up to each quilter. We do suggest that you pick a focus fabric and color before you begin to unify the various blocks. Also, consider using reproduction fabrics to achieve an aged look, but again, it's your choice.

We will be teaching 10 blocks...you may do all of them and have a bed sized quilt or some of them and have a wall hanging. Joyce Noell will be teaching this month's block, the Virginia block. Each teacher is making two blocks, one to keep and one to donate for a raffle quilt to benefit our guild. Please keep in mind that we do have our Guild Quilt Show in 2008, and it is hoped that many of these projects will be on display. Keep up with your blocks!

Our raffle quilt is now complete except for the binding. Tickets will soon be for sale on this amazing quilting project.

BOOK REVIEW: by Pamela Skilton

RAGGEDY REVERSE APPLIQUE by Kim Denealut

What a lovely book! It is beautifully produced; colors are vibrant, layout and instructions are clear, and the format is easy to follow.

Nine full-size patterns are provided in an envelope inside the back cover. The patterns are marked to show the order of cutting away the layers of fabric, to develop the design. It's good to have this information as the only tricky part of the process is the correct cutting order. The cuts are numbered, so if you follow carefully, the right fabric should be exposed beneath each cut.

"Raggedy" designs have become popular in recent years, especially with growing selections of flannels, homespuns and batiks now on the market.

One section in the book discusses fabrics and the different ways in which they fray. The designs illustrated mostly make use of fat quarters. Kim uses them for pillows as well as blocks, so in order to get started, you need only 3 or 4 fat quarters, and by the end of the evening you've finished your first pillow!

The book is friendly, chatty and encouraging. It is a good, clear, "how to" book, with lots of suggestions for branching out with your own designs. Do you remember Kim's visit to our Guild, and her demonstration of the Raggedy Reverse Techniques? Well, reading this book is like having Kim with you, working with you as you design and complete one of her designs-or one of your own. You are definitely going to enjoy yourself as you read this book!

(NOTE: Kim has written a dedication to the Lake Quilters in our copy of her book. You will find it in the Guild Library under "Applique". You may also purchase your own autographed copy at The General Store or Smith Mountain Lake Quilting.)


