2009 CHALLENGE: THINK GREEN!

The 2009 quilting challenge for the Guild is entitled "My Interpretation of the Color Green" or "Think Green!"

When did you first notice the color green? Of course, as a small child you would have noticed green grass and leaves, maybe you had a green dress, but when was the first time you *actually* noticed green? I have thinking of this lately in relation to our challenge.

The first time I can remember green as a unique color is when finger painting in first grade (no pre-school in Virginia when I was a child). The teacher showed us how blue and yellow paint combined to make the color green. I have a strong memory of being astonished at such a phenomenon.

How can I relate this memory to a quilt? At first, I thought I would put a blue circle overlapping a yellow circle with green where they overlapped. But even my husband who is a math whiz would not want a quilt of a Venn diagram! Stay tuned, hopefully, as the Challenge Coordinator, I will come up with a decent idea.

I've had some feedback from Guild members that we should not have a size limitation on challenge quilts. We have a limitation this year for two reasons: to encourage participation and to have ample space for all entries at the Christmas Party when the quilts are displayed for the first time. It was difficult last year to view all the quilts when we had no size limitation.

Lynne likes sharing the things that she has learned over the last several years with others and is planning on designing her own patterns.

Guidelines for Workshops

Workshops are special opportunities for a small group of people (usually only 20) to have instruction from a guest teacher. Please follow these guidelines when signing up for a workshop:

- Sign-up will begin at 12:30 at the Guild meeting in the month announced for the workshop sign-up. Only people who have signed-up AND paid can attend the workshop. You are not considered "signed-up" until you pay your money!
- If you are unable to attend the guild meeting at which the sign-up occurs, have a friend sign you up and pay your money. We will **NOT** be taking phone sign-ups before this time...Please don't ask us to break this rule.
- Once the workshop is filled, a waiting list will be formed. If someone drops out of the class, the next person on the waiting list will be called. Please do not by-pass the waiting list by selling your spot to a friend. It is not fair to those who have been put on the waiting list.
- Once you are on the list, and find you will be unable to attend, you will not get a refund unless someone is found to take your place. The History of Aprons

I don't think our kids know what an apron is.

The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath, but along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven.

It was wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion was even used for cleaning out dirty ears.

From the chicken coop, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven.

When company came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids.

And when the weather was cold, grandma wrapped it around her arms.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove. Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron.

From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls. In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.

When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that 'old-time apron' that served so many purposes.

ICE - 'In Case of Emergency'

If we were to be involved in an accident or were taken ill, the people attending us would have our cell phone but wouldn't know who to call. Yes, there are hundreds of numbers stored but which one is the contact person in case of an emergency? Hence this 'ICE' (In Case of Emergency) Campaign

The concept of 'ICE' is catching on quickly. It is a method of contact during emergency situations. As cell phones are carried by the majority of the population, all you need to do is store the number of a contact person or persons who should be contacted during emergency under the name 'ICE' (In Case Of Emergency).

The idea was thought up by a paramedic who found that when he went to the scenes of accidents, there were always cell phones with patients, but they didn't know which number to call. He therefore thought that it would be a good idea if there was a nationally recognized name for this purpose. In an emergency situation, Emergency Service personnel and hospital Staff would be able to quickly contact the right person by simply dialing the number you have stored as 'ICE.'
