Martha Boschen, another LQG member, was also on the team that went from Trinity Ecumenical Parish to work as part of the Lutheran Disaster Relief Program.



I cut and installed insulation and wallboard and Martha worked in the clinic using her nursing talents. Martha took nine quilts from the Bethlehem Lutheran Church World Relief Group and donated them to the distribution center where residents come for food and other needed items. It was a wonderful experience and we were surprised to learn that most of the rebuilding of individual homes is being done by church groups from all over the US. It was very uplifting to be part of this wonderful endeavor. Our team plans to go again in November. I left behind a Friendship Star drawn on my bunk bed to encourage other volunteer workers to share a part of their other lives.

We have an opportunity to see *Quilts of the Old Dominion* displayed by the Virginia Consortium of Quilters featuring quilts made in Virginia before 1900. I know the price of gas is keeping a lot of us from taking these fun trips, but get a carpool together, share the cost, and drive to Richmond to the Virginia Historical Society. This exhibition will have three rotations: March-May, June-August and September-December 3. Classes are being offered as well as gallery walks. Book / DVD Review: by Tina Dietz

Cathedral Windows Square-by-Square (by Arlene Gray)

(DVD running time: 35 minutes)

Who among us has not been awed by the intricacy of Cathedral Windows quilts? Yet, while we've admired the dedication of those who have completed them, many of us have shied away from getting involved in such a tedious commitment ourselves. A few of us have learned enough about the method for making Cathedral Windows to know it's overly complex, and even more time consuming. At least it was, but that was before Arlene Gray came along!

In her DVD, "Cathedral Windows Square-by-Square", Gray walks us through a technique for making Cathedral Windows that is not only much easier than the traditional method most of us have been taught, but it's also much faster. She's eliminated much of the preliminaries by sewing first and ironing later. And her boldness with her hand-stitching is like a burst of freedom...with her method no eensy teensy stitches are required! Yet while her way of getting there seems like an incredible shortcut, Gray's results are the same as what one would have gotten using traditional techniques: genuine, beautiful Cathedral Windows.

Gray's step-by-step demonstrations are easy enough for beginners to follow along and will have veteran quilters wondering how making Cathedral Windows the *old* way had ever gotten so complicated to begin with. And—a bonus! Gray's demonstration includes a tip that illustrated how, with a little deliberate designing, Cathedral Windows aren't limited to being scrappy and can become something of even greater interest.

So, if you have ever wanted to make Cathedral Windows but were discouraged by all that was involved in any of the traditional methods you'd been taught, try out with the old process and in with the new. Take a peek at Arlene Gray's "Cathedral Windows Square-by-Square"!
